Emily Davison



Born: 1872 in London, England.
Died: 1913

Emily Davidson was a governess and teacher, before she became a full-time worker for the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU). Emily ran into the middle of an important horse race as part of a protest and was killed by a horse owned by King George V. Edith Cavell, Emmeline Pankhurst and Annie Kenney lived at the same time as Emily Davidson.

Rosa Parks



Born: 1913 in Alabama, USA
Died: 2005

Rosa Parks had several jobs including seamstress and working for a politician. She was also a campaigner for civil rights throughout her life. Rosa Parks was arrested when she refused to give up her seat on a bus for a white person which was the law at the time. She campaigned for a fair society and equal rights. Nelson Mandela, Martin Luther King, Mother Teresa all lived at the same time as Rosa Parks.

Key Events

Rosa Parks was born on 4th February

1913

Rosa was arrested for refusing to move from her bus seat.

1955

The 'Bus Boycott' ends and blacks are allowed to sit at the front of buses.

1956

President Clinton awards Rosa the Medal of Freedom

1996

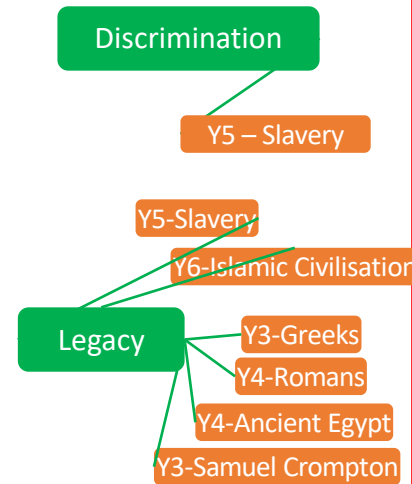
Rosa dies of natural causes.

Vocabulary

Rights: Something that you are entitled to.

Suffragette: A woman seeking the right to vote through an organised protest. E.g. Emily Davison

Campaign: An organised plan to achieve a goal.

Segregation: Enforced separation of different groups of people.

Ancestors: Someone who was related to you a long time ago.

Race: A group of people who share the same culture.

Protest: Expressing that you do not agree with something.

Vote: Being able to choose what you would prefer to happen.

Civil Rights: The rights of citizens for freedom and equality.

Boycott: When you refuse to use something as a form of protest.
